5 - Guitar Worship - 5

In **lesson 5** we will see how rhythm affects a song.

- The rhythm of a song is many times organized in three counts or four counts and sometimes in two or six. When you sing a song it usually comes natural and you don't think about it.
- The small organized sections are called measures and in written music they use small vertical lines to designate a measure.
- Using this system to show you measures in the song 'I surrender all' would look like this:

Typically the heavy beat would fall on number 1.

• Try to regularly clap 1 2 3 4 1 2 3 4 while humming the song and notice that the word at the beginning of each measure (All / I / all / free) falls together with your heavy clap (beat) on number 1.

The word on each beat is right below the number.

Notice that in the first measure you see 'to you', both words fall within the second beat.

• In the songs we look at today there are three beats in a measure and the heaviest beat will be on the first count. So you have | 1 2 3 | 1 2 3 | 1 2 3 |

In the song 'there is a name I love to hear' it would look as follows:


In the song 'Jesus keep me in Your Blood' it would look as follows:

- It is important to know if the song is written for three beats or four beats in a measure because it affects your strumming.
- Remember that the first beat in a new measure is most always the heaviest moment in the measure and that feels just natural.
